ALS 4932/5932 Plant Communities of the Florida Panhandle (1 Credit) Summer C 2024 Web-based Lecture



Course Description: This course will guide students through Florida's natural communities utilizing the community descriptions of the Florida Natural Areas Inventory (2010) and video lectures, video "field trips", and narrated PowerPoints in Canvas. Lectures will cover community structure, indicator species, soils and hydrology, as well as fire ecology and other important ecological processes as well as identification characterizations of key plants.

Learning Objectives: At the conclusion of this course, the student will be able to:

- Identify and characterize major terrestrial and associated wetland natural communities of the panhandle of Florida.
- Use vegetative and floral characteristics to identify key indicator plant species of the characteristic plant communities.
- Identify environmental characteristics (soils, hydrology) associated with each plant community.

Prerequisites: Prior coursework in Ecology, Environmental Sciences, Soils, Biology, and/or Botany will be beneficial. Students should have familiarity with basic biological and botanical vocabulary to facilitate understanding of plant and community identification.
